Both Donations and Sales include the whole Dist of N. C., all having passed through the central office. No accurate account of stock was taken on the last day of Jan. but it shall be done on each succeeding month. The amount of goods, clothing, implements, books et cetera on hand at that time, is by estimation six thousand dollars. This includes however, a large quantity of agricultural and mechanical tools and implements which have been furnished for and issued to the colonists at Roanoke Island, and which have been charged against them at cost prices, they being expected to pay for them when able. Much of this will never be collected and must at last be reckoned as donations.

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We regularly remit cash received to the parties forwarding the goods sold, and aim to keep nothing on hand. They re-invest the money in goods which they learn from us are most needed and most salable, and it does the same work over and over again.

The foregoing is forwarded as a portion of my monthly report for January. It gives a full account as far as it goes. Cash receipts and expenditures during the month will be transmitted very soon, as well as consolidated report of rations and persons fed.

The sales we make are mostly of dry goods and books, but recently also of hardware and groceries. Mrs. James takes more especial charge of the goods sent by benevolent Societies and individuals, acknowledges them by letter, superintends their sale and gratuitous distribution, and greatly relieves me in respect to this part of my duty.

Major General Butler

In compliance with your order of the eleventh instant; directing me to investigate the cases of alleged impressment of Colored men; for Soldiers; by Col J. A. Nelson of the 10th Regt. (Colo). I report that I proceeded to Craney Island and called Col Nelson before me; and after hearing the charges, and complaints, brought against him; ^{read} called the complainants who were sworn by me; and whose testimony is herewith annexed.

It appears that Col Nelson has a company of Snakes in different parts of the Country; at Newport-News; Norfolk; Portsmouth and elsewhere who take men from their work or from the church or the streets; which is ^{creating} causing great consternation among the Negroes in Norfolk and Portsmouth; and causing them to hide for fear of impressment; this was partly in testimony; and partly in statements (None of which was taken down) by Gentlemen that came before me; and if some active measures are not taken to stop this practice at once; volunteering in my opinion will be entirely discouraged in this section of the Country.

Q What time did you come here?

A I came here 11 O'clock on Wednesday on Thursday I think took the balls

Q What do you mean by taking balls?

A Carried Cannon balls from 12 till 9 o'clock the without anything to eat till next morning

Q What then?

A I got tired - begged the officers to go to the Colonel to let us put down the balls, they would try and do what the Colonel said

Q What happened then?

A Colonel sent word he did not persecute us for what we had done but because we did not obey orders

Q Had you disobeyed any orders?

A No Sir unless by not holding up our hands

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Q What happened then?

A Was taken again to the Guard house & kept there until next morning, then the Lieut asked us if we would hold up our hands at Musternique again.

Q What then?

A Turned loose - not persecuted since I left the Guard house took the oath to day not before -

Q By God N - did you take the oath of your own free will?

A Yes Sir - not exactly on account of the way I was brought here.

Q Why did you not step out?

A Because I thought I would be persecuted again.

Q Are you satisfied now?

A No Sir; though I have made up my mind to do the best I can.

Headquarters Colored Troops
Norfolk Va Dec 25th 1863

To Lieut Col J. B. Kinsman
A. S. C. & Chief of Colored Bureau

Sir,

I have the honor to state concerning the forcible impressment of Negro Soldiers by the recruiting officer of Col Nelson, 10th U. S. C. Troops, that I have on three occasions questioned his proceedings, and each time instructed him that nothing like Compulsion would be allowed. -

I was moved to do this by complaints coming directly to me from the families and friends of negroes, said to be forcibly impressed. These complaints were quite numerous, and my consequent inquiries all occurred during the month of November. I was unable to verify any of the complaints except one. Viz: - on one occasion Col Nelson sent out an officer in a boat, to order in all the boats of the oystering fleet lying off Craney Island, to show their passes at his wharf. When he had them assembled at the wharf he canvassed them strongly for recruits. But I could not learn that he impressed any. The only Compulsion appeared to be in ordering the boats away from their business temporarily and the amount of my rebuke was of course proportionate. Col Nelson in his defence expressed a desire that all

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Such Complaints should be sent themselves
 to General Salans to learn for themselves the
 opinions and statements of those involved.
 Several such did go thither, and, as I
 was informed, came back satisfied; among
 them Prof. Woodbury, and two Citizen Lawyers.
 I am ignorant of any such offences
 or Complaints occurring during the month
 of December, as I have been absent on a
 long Expedition.

I immediately ordered the officer making the impressment before me (who appeared with a squad of men whom he had impressed) and directed him to release the men at once. I also directed Col Nelson, by a communication from the Capt. Gales to discontinue the practice.

said the General sent him, I came
down to Norfolk the next day to the Doctors
office, next the Custom House, who exami-
ned me, and told me I was not fit
I got a Certificate from him of Disability

Mason Harrison (Leola) statement.

Am 43 years of age, and on same farm as boy Crumpler-am Law. Sergt Robert came as we were shelling Corn, asked for feed for his horse, which being given, said he wanted to have a chat with the boys.

After we got in the house, asked my name and age, told him 43, said General sent him after the boys, and he should take me, said I was a cripple, and not fit for a business like that - he did not believe me - I was crippled by a Battery, he wrote my name down, and told me to take horse of the Pen - did not know what it was, said must come down next day, and fetch the boy (last witness) with me, and I did so - said if I did not come down on the morrow would send a guard after me, therefore I came down next day, and went to the Doctors office, and to Capt Browns, Doctor examined me, and gave me Certificate of Disability (shown shown), then went back to the farm.

January 26th 1864, Examination continued.

Mr Barker (Supt Farm)

My little boy said the Sergt was breaking in my door, but the Cook has since said he did not, I was not there, this is what I heard and that the men were told they had better

James Grumpler (Boala) Statement.

Am on the Gale farm, was there when Sgt Robert came, Sgt asked me to give feed for the horse, then said he wanted us to come to the house, to have a talk with us, said he was sent by the General to get volunteers - asked the men to Enlist.

Mason particularly, said he was to old 47, to Enlist, wanted him to touch the Plw, and he would take him along, and see if they were fit, said he come to Enlist them, said he wanted Mason to bring the boy for a document, said if he did not come would send a Guard after us - was Shelling Corn.

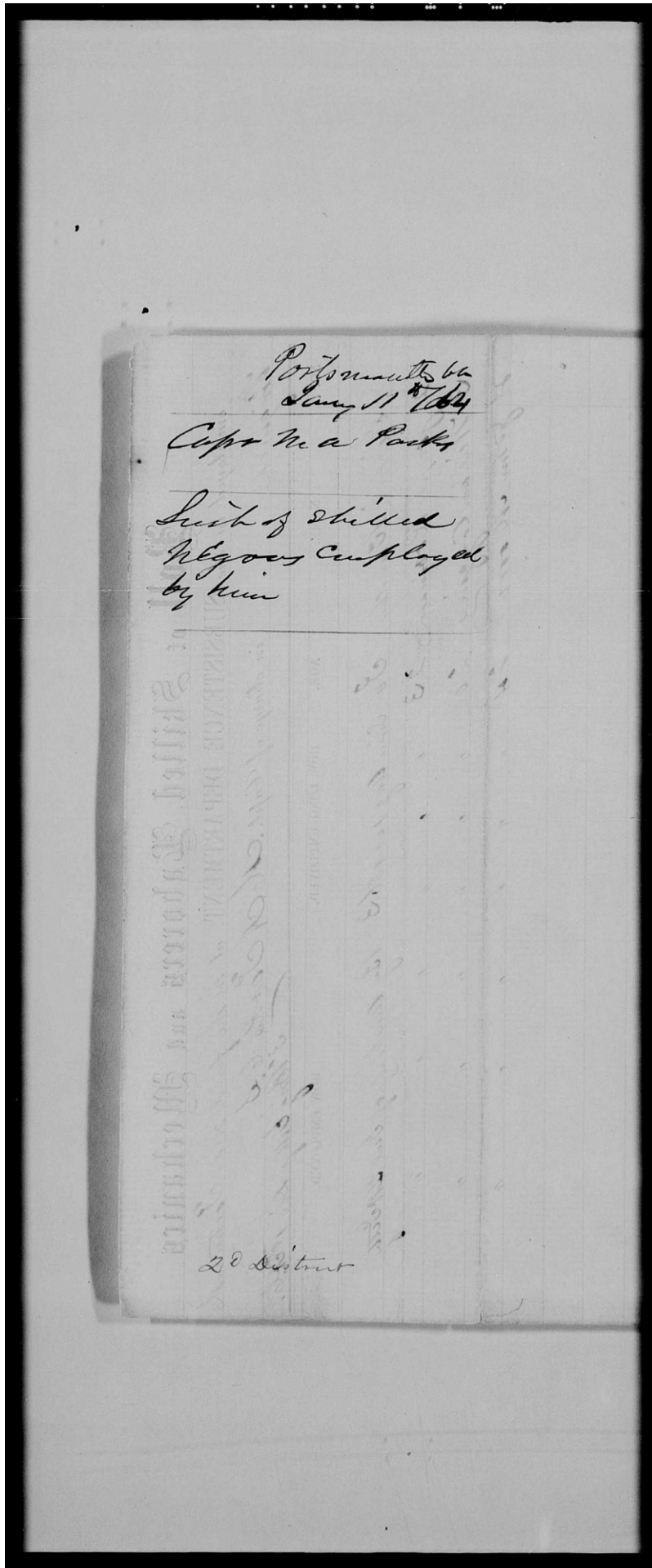

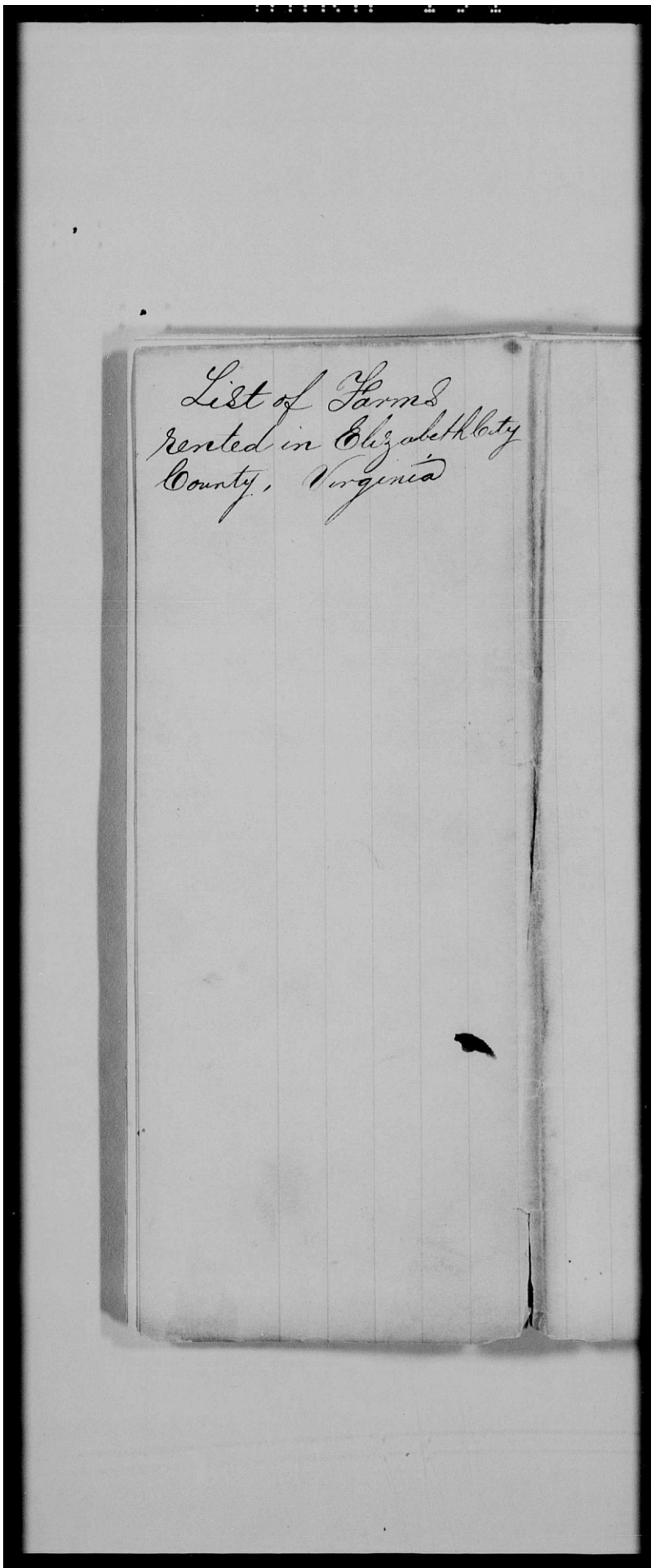
